

# Northcliffe CRC Remains Open

At the date of writing this, 3 April 2020, the NCRC is still open. Our services are limited but there are many in the community still getting the benefit of our Centrelink/ Human Services/ Government Access Point, our public access computers, our printing services, and (from a distance) some computer advice. The door is locked but just knock for entry **after washing your hands in our convenient hand basin.**

As well as any number of legal limitations designed to reduce the risk of Covid transmission, there are some other limitations:

- We can't provide Centrelink advice—self-service only.
- No close proximity computer support due to physical distance restrictions
- We only have one (often over-stretched) staff member on at a time due to need for physical distancing amongst staff. Some of our staff are still very busy with a number of projects which will continue even if we close, including archival scanning of entire Pioneer Museum photography collection. You will need to temper your demands accordingly!
- We have to close for lunch every day due to the staffing/ volunteer limitations. Generally this will be somewhere in the time frame from noon to 1pm, although we sometimes shift it a little to allow customers to complete their tasks.
- No gaming/ casual social media use.
- No unsupervised < 16 year olds before 3pm.

## What the NCRC has to be thankful about:

- Our Centrelink Access point, considered an 'essential service', gives us the option to legally remain open, for now.
- Our staff and volunteers, and those we are in regular contact with in the Northcliffe community, are in good health.
- We have a new hand basin giving us a much better opportunity to maintain a disease free environment for customers and staff... see our article elsewhere in the Karri Pigeon, thanking JPR plumbing for their generous support in procuring and installing this community asset. The basin has increased our confidence in being able to keep the NCRC open a bit longer than some other CRCs and the many other community services which have needed to close down.
- The State Government have been flexible about our services contract in light of our need to cancel some of contracted activities including film nights, a Northcliffe naturally branding program catch up event, and our regular close proximity one-on-one computer support.
- We are eligible for small business COVID relief payments from the Federal Government and additional trainee support from the State Government.
- We may be in a position to offer additional services, phone based and internet based, to Northcliffe during Covid 19.

## Northcliffe Caring and Sharing 2020 and Beyond

There is a new Facebook page "Northcliffe Caring and Sharing 2020 and Beyond". This was created by Ross Gould, as a place for us to connect, to socialise, and to arrange mutual assistance during Covid 19 lockdowns. ## Online Video Group Chats

Your options for video group catch-ups online include Skype, WhatsApp (up to 4 people), Zoom (up to 40 minutes free), Houseparty, Google

Hangouts and many more. All of these operate on a Windows computer, as well as on Android phones and tablets, on iPhones and iPads, and on Apple Macs.

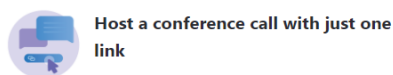
Skype now has options which we think will suit most people and which we have trialled. If you have a desktop PC or laptop you can create or join a group video chat for free, without even signing up or installing software.

Obviously you'll need to be equipped with a microphone and camera (handily—these are built into laptops, mobile phones and tablets).

Skype has come a long way - you couldn't really ask for more flexible, hassle free, video conferencing arrangements, provided you've managed to set up your camera and microphone right. There are still plenty of gotchas there!

If you have a tablet or mobile phone, install the Skype app to do this, and create a free Skype account. On a laptop computer things are even easier...
